for the financial year ended 31 December 2024

The directors present their Directors' Annual Report, combining the Directors' Report and Trustees' Report, and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2024.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Directors' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Directors' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's constitution are known as members of the board of trustees.

In this report the directors of The Community After School Project Company Limited by Guarantee present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 2024.

The company is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102, the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

The company is a company limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

**Principal Activity** 

The Community After School Project Company Limited by Guarantee (CASPr)'s overall mission is to contribute to the development of the local community by addressing the issue of educational disadvantages. The project supports local people to become actively involved in providing educational and developmental activities for children while at the same time improving their own life-situations. CASPr combines the delivery of an after-school service for children with the provision of education and training for parents. They also undertake QQI- accredited training. CASPr runs a community crèche, to make it possible for parents to take part in education and training. The project aims to solve child poverty issues within the north inner city. The company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital. There has been no significant change in these activities during the year ended 31 December 2024.

#### Mission, Objectives and Strategy

**Objectives** 

CASPr provides educational services and childcare in the North Inner City, to enable people to escape poverty and access employment. The project's childcare services aim to provide a fun, safe learning environment for children.

Activities include:

Education and Prevention:

- Provision of after-school educational and recreational activities for children, including help with homework
- Training and education of adults in QQI accredited courses (leading to Level 5 or 6 Award in Child Care)
- Community Employment and Job Initiative work for adults in after school projects and crèche.

Childcare:

- Provision of after-schools projects for children aged 4-12
- Provision of crèche for children aged 6 months to 3 years

Family Support:

- Provision of one-to-one support, advice and advocacy through the work of our Community Outreach Worker and other staff.
- Referrals to other relevant services (i.e. Health Service Executive Social Work Department; local schools, Family Support Workers; counselling services) with whom CASPr has built up close working relationships.

#### Structure, Governance and Management

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The company does not have a share capital and consequently the liability of members is limited, subject to an undertaking by each member to contribute to the net assets of liabilities of the company on winding up such amounts as may be required not exceeding one Euro (€2).

The charity was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association and managed by a Board of Directors.

Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

In this 30th year of CASPr's existence in the North East Inner City of Dublin, the charity has a continuing and developing relationship with those who use their variety of services. At present the charity employs up to 20 people at any one time operating two After Schools Clubs, serving five locals schools. The charity has a dedicated community Creche in Sean Mac Dermott Street. They offer accredited training in collaborative with the CDETB to the level of QQI Levels 5 to 6 in Early Years Education.

**Financial Review** 

The results for the financial year are set out on pages 11 and 12, and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the company had gross assets of €403,784 (2023 - €292,309) and gross liabilities of €232,145 (2023 - €283,160). The net assets of the company have increased by €162,490.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The directors have identified that the key risks and uncertainties that the company faces relate to the risk of a decrease in the level of government funding and the potential increase in the compliance requirements in accordance with company, health and safety, taxation and other legislation. The company mitigates against these risk as follows:

- The company continually monitors the level of activity and prepares and monitors its budgets, targets and projections.

- The company closely monitors emerging changes to regulations and legislation on an ongoing basis; Internal control risk is minimised by the implementation of procedures for authentication of all transactions and projects, Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers, clients and visitors to the centre.

-Operational/internal control risk is minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions

and projects and the requirements for budgets covering all activities.

-Reputational risk in common with many charities, the company's principal risk is reputational damage. Reputation damage could be caused by an event either within or outside the company's control. In order to mitigate this risk, the charity continues to adopt best practices.

The directors are not expecting to make any significant changes in the nature of the business in the near future.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the company financial statements of The Community After School Project Company Limited by Guarantee ('the Charity') for the financial year ended 31 December 2024 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities (incorporating an Income and Expenditure Account), the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and the notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is frish law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", applying Section 1A of that Standard and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

#### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Community After School Project Company Limited by Guarantee is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Ireland. The registered office of the company is 1 Portland Square, Dublin 1, D01X050, Ireland which is also the principal place of business of the company. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

the Company has applied the Charities SORP on a voluntary basis as its application is not a requirement of the current regulations for charities registered in the Republic of Ireland. As permitted by the Companies Act 2014, the company has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats, as outlined in the Companies Act 2014, are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP.

The Charity is public benefit entity.

#### Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the financial year ended 31 December 2024 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102", applying Section 1A of that Standard.

#### Fund accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

#### Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the company.

#### Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the company.
- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

#### Income

Income is recognised by inclusion in the Statement of Financial Activities only when the company is legally entitled to the income, performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, the amounts involved can be measured with sufficient reliability and it is probable that the income will be received by the company.

#### Income from charitable activities

Income from charitable activities include income earned from the supply of services under contractual arrangements and from performance related grants which have conditions that specify the provision of particular services to be provided by the company. Income from government and other co-funders is recognised when the company is legally entitled to the income because it is fulfilling the conditions contained in the related funding agreements. Where a grant is received in advance, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, it is accrued in debtors.

Grants from governments and other co-funders typically include one of the following types of conditions:

for the financial year ended 31 December 2024

- Performance based conditions: whereby the company is contractually entitled to funding only to the extent that the core objectives of the grant agreement are achieved. Where the company is meeting the core objectives of a grant agreement, it recognises the related expenditure, to the extent that it is reimbursable by the donor, as income.
- ■Time based conditions: whereby the company is contractually entitled to funding on the condition that it is utilised in a particular period. In these cases the company recognises the income to the extent it is utilised within the period specified in the agreement.

In the absence of such conditions, assuming that receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured, grant income is recognised once the company is notified of entitlement.

Grants received towards capital expenditure are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable, whichever is earlier.

#### Expenditure

Expenditure is analysed between costs of charitable activities and raising funds. The costs of each activity are separately accumulated and disclosed, and analysed according to their major components. Expenditure is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation exists as a result of a past event, a transfer of economic benefits is required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be reliably measured. Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the company but cannot be attributed to one activity. Such costs are allocated to activities in proportion to staff time spent or other suitable measure for each activity.

#### Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Musical Instruments	-	15% Straight line
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	-	15% Straight line
Motor vehicles	-	25% Straight line
Computer Equipment	-	10% Straight line

#### Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due, Income recognised by the company from government agencies and other co-funders, but not yet received at financial year end, is included in debtors.

#### Creditors

Creditors and accruals are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors and accruals are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

#### Taxation

No charge to current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable status under Sections 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, Charity No CHY 22177.

Irrecoverable value added tax is expended as incurred.

#### Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company. Annual contributions payable to the company's pension scheme are charged to the income and expenditure account in the period to which they relate

#### 3. GOING CONCERN

The directors have reviewed budgets and forecasts for a period of at least twelve months from the date of the approval of the financial statements which demonstrate that there is no material uncertainty regarding the Company's ability to meet its liabilities as they fall due, and to continue as a going concern. However, the Company is heavily reliant on fund support which is agreed annually. On this basis the directors consider it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis, Accordingly, these financial statements do not include any adjustments to the carrying amounts and classification of assets and liabilities that may arise if the entity was unable to continue as a going concern.

#### 4. PROVISIONS AVAILABLE FOR AUDITS OF SMALL ENTITIES

In common with many other company of our size and nature, we use our auditors to assist with the preparation of the financial statements.
